1.2. FROM FORMATION OFFICE

As the District Formation Coordinator, especially of the initial formation, I would like to inform you on the outcome of **a meeting of young Brothers with four Kenyan Postulants** that was held on the occasion of the Brothers' Solidarity Assembly in December 2011 in Nyahururu, Kenya.

This was the outcome of the topic prepared by the young Brothers: ***Why and how do we persevere in our vocation?***

- No Brother is a saint or an angel but a human being with his limits and fragility: *we need to practice daily patience, compassion, understanding, pardon and forgiveness.*

- No Brother is called by himself: *God calls us and acts within and through us for the good of others. Therefore we let go and let God do to accomplish his will.*

- A Brother is on a journey: *the inner conviction to be called and sent by God to serve and save others in His Name has an impact on our decisions, commitments and way of life.*

- A Brother faces challenges, disappointments and frustrations in life: *we overcome these negative forces in our lives*



by calling to mind our initial call to religious life as well as our initial conviction to join the De La Salle Brothers. Of course, our prayer life always plays a dominant role in overcoming negative forces.

- A Brother is involved in an important, life-giving and challenging mission: *we promote and transform life mainly through human and religious education.*

- A Brother experiences God's loving and saving presence in his own life: *we do not allow ourselves to become victims of negative experiences and happenings; we focus ourselves, as much as possible, on positive ones.*

- A Brother needs to be open-minded and open-hearted, an attitude that enriches his life: *we need friends with whom we can share regularly and entrust our life experiences, concerns and difficulties.*

- A Brother feels at home in his community: *we experience mutual trust, respect and understanding in communities.*

- A Brother has to learn to be patient in dealing with others: *we not only see the shadows of our companions but also their lights, their positive contributions to community and apostolic life, their talents and abilities. We give space to one another*

in order to promote our personal development and creativity. We correct one another in a fraternal and respectful way.

- A Brother is unique and lives the Lasallian charism in a particular way: *we should be ourselves and not dream of being someone else. We should never lose our identity and uniqueness.*

2. NEWS FROM THE SECTORS

2.1. SECTOR OF ERITREA

ANNUAL GATHERING OF THE ST. JOSEPH’S SCHOOL ALUMNI

On the 13th of May there was an annual gathering of all former students of St. Joseph’s School Keren. St. Joseph’s has been giving academic and Christian formation to the town of Keren and the surrounding villages for more than fifty years.



It’s former students are found in different positions of responsibility and the various professions within the country and abroad. In the last few years with the commitment and dedication of the Brothers and the School Administration, the school has been very close to the students who graduate. This care and follow-up has created great affection and attachment towards their school, teachers and between each other.



On May 13, the school administration and the PTA called for an assembly of all students who are in different Public Universities and workplaces. The Brothers, PTA and teachers were proud to see so many of our students engaged and committed in their academic advancement in a specific profession. A number of people encouraged the young men and women to continue with their education, to be confident, and to grow in the values they learn in their school, and also to think of their brothers and sisters in St. Joseph who are poor. They were encouraged to continue building the Alumni Association. In the afternoon they all had a meal together. What a great day.

THE LASALLIAN YOUTH OF KEREN

The Lasallian youth of Keren is a well organized spiritual group of both sexes. It was founded on December 12th, 1989 by the former Brother, Ghergis Amine. Initially this group started with only five members. Now it has almost 70 members. From this almost fifty are active participants, while the remaining twenty are passively involved.



There is always a Brother from Keren Community who is responsible for accompanying them and to work cooperatively along with the Brothers on their behalf. The group has a Chairman and Vice Chairman, a treasurer, Spiritual Leader, and Choir leader

The group is highly involved in the service of the Holy Savior Church at St. Joseph School Keren. In addition to that, they are also involved with ministries like: striving to raise Church awareness among the youth, bringing the youth to Jesus Christ through education, visiting physically challenged people (in hospitals and homes), helping the poor, and serving parents of war martyrs etc. They try to move towards these goals by offering different services which fulfill their mission.

They are very available and visible on Holy Days: like in the day of St. John Baptist De La Salle, the School Ceremony (St. Joseph



Day), Christmas, Easter and the Vow Ceremonies of Brothers. Not only that, they provide a very noticeable extra service in welcoming our guests during special occasions.

The future vision of this choir is creating a conducive atmosphere among the members by providing both spiritual and intellectual services based on Gospel values. However, it is obviously known that to achieve this goal they need the full attention and action of each and every individual, Brothers and family members to reach the heart of their dream.

In May 15, the Feast of St. John Baptist De La Salle, they celebrated their annual festival by gathering families, former choir members, little kids who potentially can run the organization in the future, Brothers and priests. The occasion was highlighted by dramas and songs that were prepared by the Lasallian Youth. After that, the Chairman presented to the public his reports and thanked the Brothers in general and Brother Negasi in particular for his genuine assistance and moral support. The program ended with songs of thanksgiving.

BR. YEMANU JEHAR

Br. Yemanu was born on the 7th of June 1944 in Keren, Eritrea. He joined the Keren Juniorate program in 1955. After a year, Yemanu was sent to Italy by the Italian Missionary Brothers to advance his education and discern his vocation in the Formation Houses.

Yemanu completed his Junior and High School studies there and began his Novitiate in 1961, at Tore Del Greco Napoli. He made his First Profession on the 2nd of October 1962.

In preparation for the mission, Brother Yemanu studied pedagogy and earned a Diploma from Collegio La Salle, Roma. Later he got his BA in Pedagogy and MA in Psychology from Salve Regina University in the USA.

Brother Yemanu served the District and the Institute in different capacities and held various responsibilities. He served as a teacher and Director at St. Joseph's school Keren, Collegio La Salle Asmara, St. Joseph Addis, St. Joseph Nazareth and Bistrate Gabriel, Dire Dawa. He was a pioneer in the founding the Catholic Secretariat in Asmara. He played a significant role as the head of CRS in Eritrea.

Brother Yemanu also made a tremendous contribution in the Formation Houses of the Lwanga District of Africa. He served as the Director of the Scholastics in Asmara, Director of the Postulants in South Africa, the Director of



the Juniors in Nazareth and the Director of Novices in Nairobi.

From 1981 – 1986 Brother Yemanu had served as the President of the Delegation of Ethiopia and Eritrea. From 2000 – 2006, he served the Institute as the General Councilor for the Region of Africa (RELAF)

Br. Yemanu returned to Eritrea in the year 2007 and was assigned to Hagaz Agro Technical School. However, his health was deteriorating and it was impossible for him to carry out his new responsibilities. He was suffering from high blood pressure, memory lapse and glaucoma.

Brother Yemanu was sent to Nairobi for comprehensive medical checkups and treatment. In spite of all the effort and medical attention, his condition did not be improved. He survived two minor strokes and a need arose for more follow up and greater attention. A nurse was employed to visit Brother Yemanu on a daily basis. The Brothers in Keren community did a wonderful job in taking care of him.

Unfortunately, Brother Yemanu suffered a third stroke that left him very weak and partially unconscious. From this time he needed twenty four hours attention. As a result, he was taken to the Italian Community Geriatric Center - Asmara for better follow up and further diagnosis.

Brother Yemanu was initially responding well, but this did not last long. His conditions began

deteriorating daily. He lost his courage and fighting spirit. It was painful to see Brother Yemanu losing his deep, powerful and commanding voice. It became evident that Brother Yemanu was joining St. Paul in saying ***“I have fought the good fight to the end; I have run the race to the finish; I have kept the faith ...” 2Tim4:7***

The precious and great asset of the Lwanga District and former General Councilor, Brother Yemanu Jehar was promoted to eternal glory on the 26th of March 2012 at 4:00 a.m. and his body was moved to Orot Hospital Mortuary in Asmara.

On the 28th of March 2012, at 4:00 PM, the body of Brother Yemanu was moved from Orot Morgue to the Holy Savior Parish at Villagio. Many members of Religious Congregations, Brothers, former students and relatives gathered for a special memorial ceremony and Prayer Service. His Grace, the Most Reverend Abune Mengsteab Tesfamariam, Bishop of Asmara, presided over the ceremony.

On the 29th of March, at 5:00 A.M, the body departed From Villagio to Keren for burial. Keren is the town where Yemanu was born, grew up, met the Brothers and served for the first time as a Brother. Again many Religious and friends accompanied the body during the journey to Keren which took three hours.

His Grace, the Most Reverend Abune Kidanemariam Yebiyo, Bishop of Keren, led the



burial ceremony at Keren. The Bishop is a former student of St. Joseph's School and a former student of Brother Yemanu.

The burial took place at Megarih Cemetery, 2km away from St. Joseph school. The body was lowered to the grave at 11:00 a.m.
